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Mission Statement

Stevenson is premised on a vision of education as the means by which we discover the world and contribute to its transformation. We believe that one's education is best pursued in the company of others, for others' benefit as well as one's own. A selective college-bound boarding and day school, Stevenson commits to three aims:

- to prepare students for success in school and life beyond school;
- to foster their healthy passion for learning and achievement;
- and to help them learn how to shape a joyful life.

The School 2022-2023

Founded in 1952 as a boarding school for boys, Stevenson is a co-ed independent school with day students in PK-Grade 8 (Carmel Campus) and boarding and day in grades 9-12 (Pebble Beach Campus).

- The Upper Division (9-12) of 523 students includes 243 day students and 280 boarding students, from California as well as 15 states and 23 countries around the world
- 32% of students receive financial aid
- 35% are students of color
- 61% of faculty members hold advanced degrees, 18% hold terminal degrees
- The student/teacher ratio is 10 to 1
- Stevenson is accredited by the Western Association of Schools and Colleges for a seven-year term through June 2023

Grading & Credits

STEVENSON DOES NOT RANK STUDENTS

In order to ensure a balanced life, students are generally permitted to enroll in only five academic courses per term. No more than three courses in any term may be AP or honors courses, though students may petition for a fourth.

- Grading is awarded using a scale of A-F
- Honors and AP courses receive extra weight of 0.3 grade points
- Plus and minus grades equal +/- 0.3
- All letter grades are included in the GPA
- One credit is granted for full-year courses


